


NEMBC 2017 National Conference





Keynote Speaker

Professor Gillian Triggs

Former President Australian Human Rights Commission

The NEMBC is pleased to have as the Conference keynote speaker Professor Gillian Triggs President Australian Human Rights Commission.

Professor Triggs will speak about "Multicultural Australia in a post truth era"

Emeritus Professor Gillian Triggs recently took up the position of Vice Chancellor's Fellow at the University of Melbourne, following the completion of her five year term as the President of the Australian Human Rights Commission. Prior to that, she was Dean of the Faculty of Law and Challis Professor of International Law at the University of Sydney from 2007-12 and Director of the British Institute of International and Comparative Law from 2005-7. She is a former Barrister and a Governor of the College of Law.

Professor Triggs has combined an academic career with international commercial legal practice and has advised the Australian and other governments and international organisations on international legal and trade disputes. She is the author of many books and papers on international law, including International Law, Contemporary Principles and Practices (2nd Ed, 2011).

**Minister for Communications, Minister for the Arts,
Manager of Government Business in the Senate**

Mitchell Peter "Mitch" Fifield is a member of the Australian Senate representing the state of Victoria for the Liberal Party since March 2004. Fifield served as the Assistant Minister for Social Services and the Manager of Government Business in the Senate in the Abbott Government from 18 September 2013, then became the Minister for Communications and Minister for the Arts while retaining his role as Manager of Government Business, in the Turnbull Government from 21 September 2015.

Shadow Minister for Multicultural Australia & Citizenship; Shadow Minister for Environment & Water; Shadow Minister for the Arts and Manager of Opposition Business in the 45th Australian Parliament.

In Government Tony Burke was responsible for resolving 100 years of conflict in the Murray-Darling Basin, placing Tasmania's forests on the World Heritage list, implementing the comprehensive Creative Australia arts and culture policy, and making the second-largest conservation decision in the history of the planet by protecting our oceans.


This term he has also led the fight against racial hate speech and the Turnbull government's proposed citizenship changes.

Theme

The theme for the conference is “Your Voice, Your Action, Our Change”. This conference is a call to find your voice, inspire yourself to action and create the kind of change you want to see.

Your voice: could mean a radio program, a position in the community, things written and shared on social media. It's meant as a general term for the way we “communicate” with our “voice”.

Your action: The things we do to effect and create change on a big and small scale.

Our change: Both of the above things combined, create “our change” which means shifting attitudes, changing perceptions, confronting stereotypes and effecting change for “the greater good” of a socially inclusive society.

The idea of voice, action and change needs to be seen in the context of the wider global situation where social cohesion is being eroded as society becomes more polarised and multiculturalism and diversity is often under attack. In the past many racist comments were seen as being on the fringe but now extreme hateful views are becoming part of the mainstream public discourse. It is not only the rise of ‘right-wing brigades’ and politicians such as Trump and Hanson but sections of the media have been very outspoken and have moved extremist racist views into the mainstream discussion.

As we know ethnic community broadcasting is an essential part of the media landscape in Australia and offers a major contribution to building social cohesion and strengthening multiculturalism. So how does ethnic and multicultural community broadcasting use its voice, find its action and think about change in the present climate?



Session 5 Become a Journalist and not just a Broadcaster!

Become a Journalist and not just a Broadcaster!: Being a journalist or a reporter is a 'forbidden' word in the Ethnic community broadcasting sector – Why? In reality many Ethnic radio presenters are indeed by default radio journalists. NEMBC's partnership with AFL and 3ZZZ has presented the opportunity of training radio broadcasters in live commentating and sports reporting. It is a new step forward, but why stop there, why not the Arts, Fashion, Music, or advocacy – Radio producers and presenters who have been involved with the AFL project will talk about their personal experiences, training and shall participate in a Q & A panel. Whatever your radio topic of passion, learn how to create, brand, sell and open your program for investment by attracting new listeners and sponsors alike. The NEMBC is currently reaching out and engaging Ethnic community broadcasters to become a media accredited NEMBC Radio journalist.

Session 7 An Amazing Mindframe session

This session will challenge our comforts zones: The Ethnic community broadcasting sector is extremely culturally sensitive and doesn't report on suicide, but should we be respectful and discuss these issues? That's a big question? Research suggests that whilst many migrants arrive in Australia with good mental health, their mental health tends to deteriorate after the first 12 months spent in Australia. This is often linked to the stressful process of acculturation, language and social difficulties and difficulties in finding employment. Between 2001 and 2010 persons born outside of Australia accounted for 25.1% of all nationally recorded suicide deaths.

President, Community Broadcasting Foundation




Emma Couch

eChamps is a project aimed at fostering the skills of ethnic community broadcasters and building on their capacity to inform their stations of the opportunities provided through digital engagement.


As part of the project multicultural community broadcasters from around Australia receive free training to develop their online media skills and extend their broadcasting capacity at this year's NEMBC youth and main Conference.

Training involves how to use social media and other online media tools to communicate to audiences, as well as audio and video recording skills.

NEMBC AGM 2017

The NEMBC AGM is on Sunday 9:00am, 26 November 2017, at Novotel Canberra 65 Northbourne Avenue, Canberra, ACT 2600.

We welcome ALL members of the NEMBC to attend the AGM

This year we are seeking your feedback and input on our Strategic Plan and we are asking you to fill out a Satisfaction Survey. Both these documents were sent to you in October and will be presented and discussed at the AGM.

This is an election year for: the President, Vice President, Executive, Youth and Women's Committees.

There is a simple twostep process required and both these forms are available at the registration desk:

1. Letter of Appointment from your station or organisation nominating you as a delegate.
2. As a delegate you can be nominated for Committees and need to fill out the nomination form.

Nominations for any of these committees close at 5.30pm Saturday 25 November 2017 and need to be put in the boxes at the reception desk.

The NEMBC Constitution and procedures requires that, for the purpose of nominating and voting, members must be:

- a. Financial for 2017, not later than Sunday 12 November 2017, two weeks before the AGM
- b. Represent a program broadcasting regularly, in a language other than English, or a multicultural program.
- c. Members are entitled to one vote for every five financial members, or part thereof: to be eligible for voting rights a station must have at least three financial members of the NEMBC.
- d. Only those members who have been nominated by their stations or umbrella organisations as delegates are eligible to nominate for Executive and Committee positions.
- e. Please note: for general access stations the member programs can come together and appoint their delegate(s).

Please look at the NEMBC website for any necessary documents and the breakdown of the Committee positions. Committee nomination forms are available on our website. We hope that you will be able to participate in the AGM.


