
National Ethnic and Multicultural Broadcasters Council Providing An Essential Service



The National Ethnic and Multicultural Broadcasters Council (NEMBC) is the national representative body for 600 members who provide ethnic language radio programs on 70 stations throughout Australia. This represents 125 cultural groups broadcasting over 2,000 hours a week in 110 different languages.

In order to make it easier to disperse information to this diverse community, the NEMBC has set up a special media arm, NEMBC MEDIA.

NEMBC MEDIA is able to advise and develop information campaigns, help select relevant language groups and stations, coordinate pre-produced ethnic language information direct to its member programs, produce information podcasts and advertisements and distribute these to member stations.

The role of the NEMBC in the Coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak

The NEMBC is in a prime position to distribute accurate and timely information about the coronavirus (COVID-19) to our ethnic communities via radio.

There are many people in these communities whose first language is *not* English. This means that vital information about procedures to stop the spread of the virus and what steps to take if it is contracted, may not be penetrating these communities.

NEMBC MEDIA can readily translate information across many languages, and produce these as podcasts or advertisements so that they have maximum impact in these communities.

The NEMBC has also been coordinating webinars for its broadcast members to ensure their safety when accessing the radio studio and how to manage infection control. Many stations are setting up means for broadcasters to present their programs remotely.

It is vital to keep community radio stations broadcasting because for many people in ethnic communities, this is their primary information source.

Community Broadcasting Provides An Essential Service

A recent Griffith University Report into community broadcasting revealed that while ethnic broadcasting is "providing an essential service for new migrants, it is doing far more than this - when a community becomes more established in Australia, ethnic language programs act as an important link to other members of the same community in their local area through maintenance of languages, and links to home which other information and media sources cannot provide".

Languages broadcast on ethnic community radio stations
